#### From your pastor ...

In last Sunday's column, I indicated that soon we shall bring to conclusion the renovation of our Church interior with the installation of a custom-built communion rail that will match the altar, the ambo (lectern from which the Word of God is proclaimed) and the baptismal font. This will bring to completion our renovation that began in 2019 with the replacement of the carpeting in the sanctuary with the marble tile, followed by the replacement of the wood ambo with the present one, constructed from marble that corresponds to our altar. More recently, the more major renovation took place in the nave with the removal of the asbestos floor tile to be replaced by the porcelain tile, including two medallions inlaid in the main aisle: a symbol of Mary, assumed into heaven and the eucharistic image of a mother pelican (symbolizing Christ) feeding her off-spring with her own flesh and blood, located near where Holy Communion is distributed. Also accomplished in this major renovation was the painting of the entire interior of the church, with a new painting of the Alpha and the Omega on the front wall of the sanctuary.

As I mentioned in last week's column, the altar railing was initially proposed by a group of parishioners at the same time as the planning of the new sanctuary floor. At that time, there were no active plans for the railing, but I signaled my willingness to pursue this possibility later. In the meantime, I asked if there could be a way to gauge the interest among other parishioners for this possibility. A few months later, I received the names of 82 parishioners, who had signed their names indicating their desire to have the communion rail restored to our church. Because of the plan that was already developing for the major renovation in the nave, the communion rail was put on hold.

The time has finally arrived to pursue the re-installation of the communion rail. The original construction of our church included a communion rail. The exact year that it was removed is not known, but it seems to have been in the early 1980's. This was a time when an interpretation of the Second Vatican Council was being used to 'deconstruct' the classical architecture and liturgical appointments of churches. Often people were told that the Second Vatican Council required such changes, when in fact this was never true. With the installation of the rail, we will have restored our church to it original design.

I have contacted the same firm that was involved in the construction of the ambo. They have indicated that we should be able to access the same marble as was used for the ambo and which corresponds to our altar.

As I did in last week's column, I wish to make clear that with the return of the communion rail, no one will be required to kneel to receive Holy Communion. If you prefer not to kneel or cannot do so because of physical limitations, you will be able to stand. The only difference will be that rather than standing behind another person, slowly moving up the main aisle, you will stand alongside your fellow communicants, who may be standing or kneeling along the railing. Receiving our Lord alongside one another will enhance a communal reception.

Communicants will be stationary for a few moments before receiving Holy Communion, giving time to for recollection and focusing on the altar of sacrifice in the sanctuary from where the body and blood of our Lord appears. The altar of sacrifice which corresponds to the cross on which Jesus was sacrificed, "once for all", links the real presence of Christ made present through the consecration of bread and wine to the "altar" of communion (the communion rail), where holy communion is now brought to the faithful. Rather than the faithful continually moving to receive our Lord, they are able to wait expectingly, as Christ comes to them. Also, use of the communion rail allows for reception of our Lord either on the tongue or in the hand.

In the weeks to come, I hope to provide more spiritual and theological reflection concerning the installation of the altar rail. In all likelihood, (as done in this column) I will repeat some of what I have already written, so that eventually the great majority of our parishioners will have sufficient information and knowledge as to what is transpiring. Also, soon, I hope to make available a rendering of the communion railing.

Finally, once again, I commend to you a prayer from the Roman Missal that you may wish to use during this time as we anticipate the installation of Bishop Gerard Battersby as our Diocesan Bishop.

O God, eternal shepherd of the faithful, who tend your Church in countless ways and rule over her in love, grant, we pray, that Gerard, your servant, whom you have set over your people, may preside in place of Christ over the flock whose shepherd he is, and be faithful as a teacher of doctrine, a Priest of sacred worship and as one who serves them by governing, We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Until I write again, may God bless you and all the parishioners of Saint Mary's Parish.

The 8th grade class, along with four wonderful chaperones recently returned from the Father Beiting Appalachian Mission Center in Eastern Kentucky.


