From your pastor . . .

I have written this column on the 14th of September a few days before leaving for my vacation. I want to use part of this space to introduce to you Father Thomas Ayepa from the Diocese of Moroto in Uganda, Africa who will be making a missionary appeal in person this next weekend, October 8-9. Father Thomas will tell you about the needs of his diocese in his homily and ask you to consider making a contribution toward those needs. An envelope for that purpose will be attached to the next bulletin. The second collection for Father's appeal will be taken up October 15-16th.

By this time, all of you should have received a large white envelope in the mail with a large seven-page brochure with colored photos of renderings of the proposed renovation to the nave (where the pews and aisles are located) that will be financed through the **Inspired by the Spirit** capital campaign.

The pews will be removed from the floor, disassembled, loaded onto a truck, and transported to a refinishing facility. Existing finish will be completely stripped, wiped clean with lacquer thinner and wiped dry. The bare wood will then be completely sanded and stained a darker color that will match the same color as the beautiful wood in our church ceiling. Then one coat of sanding sealer will be sprayed on and allowed to dry and then the pews will be sanded again. The two coats of hard semi-gloss lacquer will be applied which should give a long lasting, durable finish. The pews will then be transported back to the church, reassembled and reinstalled. New metal kneelers will replace the heavy oak ones that are original to the church. They will be much lighter and better cushioned. When the pews are replaced, the space between them will be increased by 4 inches to make it easier for entrance and exit.

After the pews are removed, an asbestos abatement firm, Robinson Brothers located in Waunakee, Wi. will remove and dispose of approximately 4,000 square feet of asbestos tile and mastic from the church.

CI Porcelain Tile will be used under the pews (green) and in all the aisles (bone color which matches the marble in the altars). This tile is made in the USA and is designed for commercial floor applications. It is rated in the top categories for Coefficient of Friction, Durability, Classification, Water Absorption, Shade Variation and Break Strength. The two medallions, a symbol of the Eucharist (Pelican), placed at the head of the main aisle where Holy Communion is distributed, and a symbolic lettering of Mary's Assumption placed at the entrance in the main aisle, will both be constructed from colored CI Porcelain tile.

The Alpha and Omega (the two letters of the beginning and the end of the Greek Alphabet) which have been painted on our sanctuary wall for decades, will be replaced by a different and more vibrant presentation of the Alpha and Omega. Please consult the renderings that have been placed on easels near the entrances to the church. They also appear in the brochure you have received.

During the renovation, we will move to the undercroft for the student weekday Mass and the Sunday Masses. The other weekday Masses will be celebrated in the convent chapel. We are hoping the work can be completed in six weeks. This would be before Lent which begins with Ash Wednesday on February 22, 2023.

In my next column I hope to write a description of the symbolic meaning of the Pelican medallion that will be presented at the head of the main aisle where we receive Holy Communion.

Until I write again, may God bless you and all the parishioners of Saint Mary's Parish.
