

From your pastor . . .

This past week we exercised our right as Americans to vote. In so doing, by an act of religious liberty, we expressed our conscience by choosing those who will govern our nation and state. I wish to use the remainder of this column to reflect on the importance of religious liberty by reproducing an essay that appeared in the October newsletter, *Salve* (Hail) that is printed by the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe near La Crosse. The author of the essay is Father Paul Check, who serves as the director of the Shrine. His essay appears in *italics*.

"Religious liberty as a civil right is, of course, of great importance. We wish to worship, privately and publicly, according to our conscience and our baptism. We also want the freedom to proclaim Christ crucified in the public square. Yet religious liberty is more than a civil right. It is not grounded in the positive law, the law of this nation, as good as that may be. Religious liberty is grounded in the nature of man.

Man is a spiritual being and has a fundamental moral direction. This aspect of our nature is not conferred upon us by the civil authority. It comes to us because we are created in the image of God. Thus, the idea that morality follows the popular vote or is subject to the majority opinion is not where our understand of the common good begins.

In some areas, natural moral standards are self-evident: lying, cheating, and stealing, though we may do them or see an advantage in them, are typically understood to weaken the fabric of human relationships, to the detriment of the family, community, and civil society. These questions can become more difficult and controversial in the intimate realm, i.e., matters related to purity and chastity.

Nevertheless, the foundational moral direction of our humanity is set in us and given to us by our Creator, as is our nature as spiritual beings. So, while we prize religious liberty as something that we must protect in the civil order, it ultimately comes to us not from the civil authority, but because we are God's children.

Christ gives us a clear understanding of this moral direction, particularly in the Sermon on the Mount. Some have called this Sermon the Magna Carta of Christian morality. If we want to know how to live an authentically Christian life, we must embrace Chapters 5-7 of St. Matthew's Gospel, beginning with the Beatitudes.

These moral prescriptions in the Sermon on the Mont presume that our nature has a foundational direction toward the good, and that we are spiritual beings. But Christ's new Law of grace takes what is already present in the nature and elevates it. This is why St. Thomas says that grace perfects nature or fulfills nature. Grace begins with what is in us, as we have been created, and make s it better, higher, and indeed holy.

What is the best service that we, blessed by grace, can do for our nation? We can give testimony to the veracity of the Gospel by living as Christ taught us. That will always be the best work that we can do as citizens. Yes, we have the right to vote and so on, and these civic responsibilities are certainly of great value; but imagine the power and influence of one holy persona in a community. We know how decisive the saints are in bringing people to the truth through their own witness and testimony.

Christ teaches us, in the sermon on the Mount, how to live such a saintly life. Stop judging that you will not be judged (Mt 7:1), notice the plank in your own eye before the splinter in your brother's eye (Mt 7:3), and so on. This holy life, if Christians really live this way, is the best service we can offer to our country, and people will be drawn to desire grace for themselves. They will see it and acknowledge it. They will know it, even in spite of themselves. Our Lord prophesied as much: "By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (Jn 13:35). This is the context of all Christian moral teaching."

Following this teaching is not simply about obeying a set of commands and prohibitions, it involves bearing witness to Christ through a holy life. As important as our civil liberties are, we as Christians must understand their origin, their purpose, and what we can really do to make our nation, our community, and our family more pleasing to God, by the holy lives that we strive to live with his grace.

If you have never visited the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe, located on Hwy 14 approximately one mile east of La Crosse, I recommend that you do so. There, you will be exposed to many graces that will help you become holy, as written about by Father Check.

Until I write again, may God bless you and all the parishioners of Saint Mary's Parish.




