

#### From your pastor . . .

I take this occasion on this Mother's Day to ask God's special blessings on all mothers, living and deceased. Thank you for all the good you have carried out for your families. May God richly reward you for your love and generosity.

A baccalaureate service for the 2021 Richland Center High School senior class will take place on Sunday, May 16<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 p.m. in the High School Auditorium. Attendance is limited to graduates and immediate family members.

Guest speaker for the evening is Dr. Andrew Wright, local physician and family practitioner.

The baccalaureate service is sponsored by the Richland Center Ministerial Association which provides a \$300 scholarship to a graduate who must be in attendance at the service. I encourage all of our graduating seniors from our parish to attend.

I wish to continue with the teaching that was begun in last Sunday's column concerning the Church's response to the issue of racism which is a provocative issue at this time throughout the nation. The document that I am reproducing in *italic* type is from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, entitled, *Open Wider Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love – A Pastoral Letter Against Racism.* This statement was promulgated in 2018.

Racism comes in many forms. It can be seen in deliberate, sinful acts. In recent times, we have seen bold expressions of racism by groups as well as individuals. The re-appearance of symbols of hatred, such as nooses and swastikas in public spaces, is a tragic indicator of rising racial and ethnic animus. All too often, Hispanics and African Americans, for example, face discrimination in hiring, housing, educational opportunities, and incarceration. Racial profiling frequently targets Hispanics for selective immigration enforcement practices, and African Americans, for suspected criminal activity. There is also the growing fear and harassment of persons from majority Muslim countries. Extreme nationalist ideologies are feeding the American public discourse with xenophobic rhetoric that instigates fear against foreigners, immigrants, and refuges. Finally, too often racism come in the form of the sin of omission, when individuals, communities, and even churches remain silent and fail to act against racial injustice when it is encountered.

Racism can often be found in our hearts – in many cases placed there unwillingly or unknowingly by our upbringing and culture. As such, it can lead to thought and actions that we do not even see as racist, but nonetheless flow from the same prejudicial root. Consciously or subconsciously, this attitude of superiority can be seen in how certain groups of people are vilified, called criminals, or are perceived as being unable to contribute to society, even unworthy of its benefits. Racism can also be institutional, when practices or traditions are upheld that treat certain groups unjustly. The cumulative effects of personal sins of racism have led to social structures of injustice and violence that makes us all accomplices in racism.(3)

We read the headlines that report the killing of unarmed African Americans by low enforcement officials. In our prisons, the number of inmates of color, notably those who are brown and black, is grossly disproportionate.(4) Despite the great blessing of liberty that this country offers, we must admit the plain truth that for many of our fellow citizens, who have done nothing wrong, interactions with the police are often fraught with fear and even danger. At the same time, we reject harsh rhetoric that belittles and dehumanizes law enforcement personnel who labor to keep our communities safe. We also condemn violent attacks against the police.

In 201, blacks represented 12% of the U.S. adult population but 33% of the sentenced prison population. Whites accounted for 64% of adults by 30% of prisoners. Group CPR trainings have greatly decreased due to Covid, and so they have a new way to get people informally trained. This is not an official training where the person is tested and receives an official card, but it's a great training for families and others in the community to get some basic CPR experience. Each kit, which is not much bigger than a binder, includes a DVD training video, as well as other information and an actual practice dummy. Interested parties can watch the video and go through the training and feel better prepared in emergency situations.


