### From your pastor ...

I learned this past week at the Presbyteral Council meeting with Bishop Callahan that the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation will commence on Sunday, June 27<sup>th</sup>. I believe the Bishop is planning to correspond with all Catholics in the La Crosse Diocese about this through a mailing that will come to your homes.

This will allow for a return to the use of liturgical ministers – ushers (a regular collection taken up), readers, servers and extra-ordinary ministers of Holy Communion when needed. Deacon Tully and I will be processing out of the Church after Mass where we will now greet parishioners. Also this means that our undercroft will be available for public gatherings, including funeral luncheons (providing this corresponds to the PCCW schedule). Also, the meetings of the consultative bodies such as the finance and pastoral council can also begin to meet. In the past we have not met during the summertime, so we will consider whether to wait or schedule during the summer.

It has been a long wait. Thank you for your perseverance. If you have any questions about how things will proceed please contact the rectory and we will try to respond. We may not have an immediate answer for every question.

As you may have noticed, I am no longer using a cane to aid my walking. While there is still some pain when I "overdo" it, for the most part the healing is on its way to completion. Thank you for your prayers for my recovery.

I will continue with the teaching that has been ongoing over the past weeks concerning the Church's response to the issue of racism. The document that I am reproducing in *italic* type is from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, entitled, *Open Wider Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love – A Pastoral Letter Against Racism.* This statement was promulgated in 2018.

"Although our nation has moved forward in a number of ways against racial discrimination, we have lost ground in others. Despite significant progress in civil law with regard to racism, societal realities indicate a need for further catechesis to facilitate conversion of hearts. Too many good and faithful Catholics remain unaware of the connection between institutional racism and the continued erosion of the sanctity of life. We are not finished with the work. The evil of racism festers in part because, as a nation, there has been very limited formal acknowledgment of the harm done to so many, no moment of atonement, no national process of reconciliation and, all too often a neglect of our history. Many of our institutions still harbor, and too many of our laws still sanction, practices that deny justice and equal access to certain groups of people. God demands more from us. We cannot, therefore, look upon the progress against racism in recent decades and conclude that our current situation meets the standard of justice. In fact, God demand what is right and just.

As Christians, we are called to listen and know the stories of our brothers and sisters. We must create opportunities to hear, with open hearts, the tragic stories that are deeply imprinted on the lives of our brothers and sisters, if we are to be moved with empathy, to promote justice. Many groups, such as the Irish, Italians, Mexicans, Puerto Ricans, Poles, Jews, Chinese, and Japanese, can attest to having been the target of racial and ethnic prejudice in this country. It is also true that many groups are still experiencing prejudice, including rising anti-Semitism, the discrimination many Hispanics face today, and anti-Muslim sentiment. Especially instructive at this moment, however, are the historical and contemporary experiences of Native and African Americans."

The next installment will focus on the experience of the Native American People in the United States.
